SOCIAL SECURITY ASSOCIATION OF INDIA

The Social Security Association of India was formed with the primary objective of promoting social security in India. The Association was inaugurated by the then Union Finance Minister, Dr. Man Mohan Singh, in December 1991. It was registered as a society under the Societies Registration Act, in July 1992.

Composition

The Association consists of social security institutions, public administrators, serving and retired trade unions and trade union leaders, managers, management consultants, judges, lawyers, academicians, experts in social security and other persons interested in social security.

There are seven classes of members, viz.

Other organisations
Life members (Individuals)

Institutional members

Institutions administering social security programmes including welfare funds can become members of the Association on payment of an annual membership fee of Rs.1000 only. They can become permanent members of the Association on making a one time payment of Rs.10,000.

The following institutions have become permanent members of the Association:

- (a) Employees' State Insurance Corporation
- (b) Employees' Provident Fund Organization
- (c) Kerala Head load Workers Welfare Board
- (d) Kerala Fishermen's Welfare Fund Board
- (e) Kerala Abkari Workers Welfare Fund Board

Organisations of workers

Trade unions and other organizations of workers can become members of the Association on payment of a fee of Rs.500 annually. They can become permanent members of the Association by making a one time payment of Rs.5000.

The following trade unions and other organizations of workers have become permanent members of the Association:

- (b) Textile Mazdoor Ekta Union
- (c) All India Bank Employees Association

Individual members

An individual can become a member of the Association on payment of a fee of Rs.200 annually. One can become a life member of the Association on making a one time payment of Rs.2000.

Corporate members

A Company or a Corporation can become a member by payment of an annual fee of Rs.10, 000. A Company or a Corporation can become a permanent member on payment of Rs.25000/Rs.50,000/Rs.1,00,000 on the basis of the classification of size of business of the Company as large scale, medium scale or small scale business unit.

Other organisations

Other academic organizations can become members of the Association on payment of a fee of Rs.500 annually. An organization can become a permanent member of the Association on making a one time payment of Rs.5000.

Mahatma Gandhi Labour Institute Ahmedabad has become a permanent member of the Association.

General Body

All the members together constitute the General Body of the Association. The General Body meets at least once in every year and more often as necessary. The General Body elects the Governing Body, approves the annual programmes, accounts and reports. Any amendment to the rules and regulations of the Association requires the approval of the General Body.

Governing Body

The authority and responsibility for the management of the Association vest in the Governing Body. It consists of ten members who are elected by the General Body and five nominated/special invitees to the Governing Body.

Object of the Association

The Association has been formed with the primary of objective of promoting social security in India.

Social security is the security provided by the State or society to an individual against social and economic distress, temporary or chronic, caused by the lack or loss of employment and the means of livelihood.

Social Security is a basic human right. Constitution of India mandates that the State should within the limits of its economic capacity and development make effective provision for securing interalia the right to work and to public assistance in case of need. The Central and State Governments have introduced several statutory and other measures to provide social security to the people of India but the coverage of the schemes in terms of numbers and also in terms of the benefits is small and their implementation leaves much to be desired. There is therefore an

obvious need for appropriate measures to extend the coverage and to improve the services. It is undoubtedly the function of the appropriate Government to take necessary action but government does not ordinarily act unless it is prompted to do so. Voluntary people's organizations have a role to play in prompting the governments to take such actions as necessary in public interest. Social Security Association of India is a voluntary organization which aims at getting the coverage of social security extended so as to be universal and comprehensive in its scope and to get the schemes of social security implemented effectively and efficiently.

Functions

The main functions of the Association are:

- To conduct studies and research into the existing laws and schemes of social security, their coverage and extension and their implementation
- To provide a forum for free and frank discussion on the various aspects of social security, particularly the need for and the feasibility of introducing new laws and schemes, strategies for providing social security to people outside the organized sector of employment, methods of financing and administration of the schemes, through seminars, symposia workshops and other forms of discussion and debate
- To maintain a database, a library and to disseminate information concerning social security.
- To organise educational and training programmes on social security so as to create awareness about social security.
